The American Jewish Congress which, in 1919, played an outstanding part in bringing about the incorporation of the Balfour Declaration in the Peace Treaties, will hold a public meeting at Carnegie Hall on Sunday, Oct. 30th, to discuss the further action which American Jewry can take to prevent the now bruited nullification of the pledges incorporated in the Balfour Declaration. New York-(Special)-Asserting that Great Britain must be given unmistakable evidence of the profound concern not merely of all Jews in the United States but many enlightened Christian clergymen and lay leaders who recognize that the closing of the doors of Palestine to Jewish refugees at this time would not only be a cruel blow to the victims of oppression but another capitulation to force and violence, the Emergency Committee on Palestine, representing every phase of

In announcing its decision the Emergency Committee on Palestine issued a statement in which it declared that the problem in Palestine far transgressed the boundaries of Jewish life or the geographic limita-tions of the Near East but concerned all men devoted to the principles social justice and democracy. The statement said:

Traditional Ceremonial To Be Held At Baron Hirsch Synagogue "This is a solemn hour for the Jew-ish people. We cannot permit Pales-tine to be made the next sacrifice to force and violence at the expense of rights and privileges guaranteed by international treaties and by the treaty between the British Govern-ment and the United States. American Jewry stands united as one man in this moment of crisis. All differ-ences of social or religious outlook have fallen away. All disagreements have been discarded. Not only does Jewry in the United State present a united front in this emergency, but it is greatly fortified by the coopera-tion and support that have been of-fered by many prominent Christian leaders and by many outstanding scholars and writers who have recognized that the closing of the doors of Palestine at this time would not only be a disastrous blow to Jewish refu-gees who look to Palestine as their (Continued on Page 7)



THE VOICE OF DEMOCRACY

A united American Jewry, backed by large segments of the rest of the American people through their duly elected legislative representatives, has protested in no uncertain terms against the threatened abrogation of the Balfour Declaration. The spiritual leadership of this country as well as representatives of our intellectual world have pleaded for a just and fair solution of the present Palestine dilemma. Even in the phlegmatic ears of British statesmanship the American outcry against and curtailment of Jewish rights in Palestine must have had a ring of authentic indignation which the British Government cannot ignore if it values American friendship.

The statement of Secretary of State Hull on the Palestine question was couched in cautions, diplomatic language which promises nothing yet does express genuine concern for American interests in Palestine. It is of course idle to speculate to what lengths the American Government would be prepared to go to change the viewpoint of the British Government as regards a drastic change in its Palestine policy. Yet the impression is gaining ground that Washington will do everything within its legitimate diplomatic rights to argue this point with the British Government. It goes without saying that from the British viewpoint the Palestine issue transcends the Jewish question, being intimately related to the new post-Munich orientation. Much, therefore, depends on the reception the Woodhead Report receives in the House of Commons. It would surprise close observers if, in the event that the division in Parliament is close, Mr. Chamberlain were to insist on the acceptance of that report.

Even if American public opinion has done nothing more than to impress upon the British Parliament and upon the British people that the American people would lose much of their pro-British sentiment if Mr. Chamberlain were to railroad through another

"peace with honor" on the Mediterranean front-even if American public opinion has achieved nothing more than this it has rendered a great service to the cause of democracy. In any case, America has spoken in the ringing voice of true democracy.

WHERE CATHOLICS STAND

No one doubts that Catholics are quite as strongly opposed to Nazism as are Jews, but because Catholics rarely voice this opposition in the form of mass demonstrations or protest meetings the uninformed might feel that they are not as actively anti-Nazi as they should be. The vigorous pronouncements of the Pope have of course been widely discussed but the attitude of the rank and file of Catholics is not as well known as it should be.

The fact is, however, that Catholics see the menace of Nazism clearly. Only last week on three widely scattered fronts individual Catholics gave dramatic expression to their anti-Nazi sentiments. In the Hungarian town of Sobron a group of Catholic girls, incensed at the action of Nazi vandals who smeared the local synagogue building with tar and smashed its windows, went in a body to the rabbi and offered to help clean the synagogue. In Ottawa, Canada, a delegate of Jewish origin attending the first Catholic Youth Congress received a tremendous ovation from the 15,000 people present while a German delegate was greeted with hoots and catcalls as the congress endorsed a statement that "Catholics do not approve of racial boundaries." In New York, Dock Commissioner John McKenzie, a Catholic, notified German Ambassador Hans Dieckhoff that, as a Catholic, he would have no further social relations with Germans "until the Reich returns to the path of civilization in religious freedom."

These incidents could be greatly multiplied but they are sufficient to reveal the tenor of Catholic public opinion. Under the leadership of Pope Pius, world Catholicism has come to understand that Nazism is anti-Christian as well as anti-Semitic.

BRITAIN ASKS DOMINIONS TO ADMIT 20,000 SUDETEN REFUGEES

Ottawa, (WNS)-Officials of the League of Nations Society of Cana-da have been told that the British government is asking the dominions to aid in settling 20,000 anti-Nazi German refugees forced to flee from the Sudetenland. This was disclosed when Robert Inch, secretary of the Society, made public a cable from F. E. Figgures, Secretary of the Overseas Committee of the League of Na-tions Union and secretary-general of the International Federation of League of Nations Societies, which read: "Czechoslovak refugee situation desperate. His Majesty's Government asking dominions to assist settlement of 20,000 Sudeten Germans. Please help with your government."



TUMULTY, WILSON'S SECRE-TARY, URGES ROOSEVELT TO SAVE JEWISH PALESTINE


Washington, D. C. (WNS)-Recalling that President Woodrow Wilson, under whose administration Franklin D. Roosevelt served as assistant Sec-retary of the Navy, had helped draft the Balfour Declaration, Joseph P. Tumulty former computer P. Tumulty, former secretary to Presi-dent Wilson, telegraphed President Roosevelt an appeal to stand by the Wilsonian policy with regard to Pal-estine. Declaring that the United States Government shared in the responsibility for establishing the Jew-ish National Home in Palestine, Tumulty urged the President to use his good offices to prevent any change in Britain's policy that would halt Jewish immigration.

In his appeal Tumulty said: "For several months in 1917 there was an exchange of correspondence between President Wilson and the British War Cabinet with regard British war cabinet with regard to the language to be used in the Bal-four Declaration. The president con-tinuously emphasized the need of making Jewish rights in the country making Jewish rights in the country as broad as possible in order to facili-tate their reconstructed program. It was on October 17,1917, that Presi-dent Wilson cabled to the British Government his approval of a re-vised text of the Balfour Declaration that was unblished as Neurophysical that was published on November 2 to assure the establishment in Palestine of a national home for the Jewish people, Almost a year later



War orphans constituted 7½ per cent of the total Jewish population of the country. From 1919-1928 the Joint Distribution Committee cared for about 4,000 orphans through a spe-cial Palestine Orphan Committee. The peak year was 1920, when 4,039 chil-dren were under the care of the com-mittee. By the end of 1928, only 102 still needed pretection and help. In 1921, the J. D. C. began work on the project which resulted in what is probably one of its greatest con-tributions to Palestine—the eradica-tion of malaria. The wiping out of this dread disease made possible the development of the country to a de-gree which could not otherwise be at-tained. The pioneer work was begun by a Malaria Research Unit, and con-ducted in conjunction with the De-partment of Health of the Palestine Government. As a result of the work of this unit, a second unit was sent partment of Health of the Palestine Government. As a result of the work of this unit, a second unit was sent into the field by the Rockefeller Foun-dation. The Medical Committee of the Joint Distribution Committee also co-operated with the Zionist Organiza-tion and Hadassah in hospital and medical projects.

The Joint Distribution Committee was also instrumental in organizing a number of important cooperative enterprises and in 1926, turned over its cash and investments in Palestine to a new organization, the Palestine Economic Corporation, which also acquired the assets of the Palwhich estine Cooperative Company. Through the Palestine Economic Corporation, the Joint Distribution Committee has continued its constructive contribu tion to Palestine. In addition, in recent years the J. D. C. has made contri-butions to the cultural development

of Palestine, chiefly through the Hebrew University.



Constantine called himself a Christian, but his policies were not fundamentally distinguish. were not fundamentally distinguish-able from those of Diocletian. The Christian Emperor did not, any more than his pagan predecessors, make any effort to liberate the provinces, to restore human learning, to spread true piety, or to curb the military ma-chine, that broken reed on which Rome relied and which ultimately pierced its body

Yet, significantly, even this formal and minimal acceptance of Christianity in the Roman world had far-reaching effects on the destiny of civili-zation. When the collapse of the Empire occurred, the disruption of com-merce and the difficulty of travel did not leave everyone a barbarian provincial. There were some minds in which the idea of a Catholic or uni-

versal Church took the place of that of a universal government. The con-ception of a world order persisted among large sections of the people. But even more important than this was the fact that the Church alone in western Christendom, preserved some fragments of ancient learning. In the course of time, the art of reading and writing became obsolete, and men held it a disgrace to be mas-ters of those fundamental skills. With With astounding historical insight, Shakes peare makes Hamlet reflect the spirit of this period, when he says: "I once did hold it, as our statists do.

tion than found a refuge in the West-ern Church, was naturally preserved in the Eastern Empire which had been more thoroughly Christianized, and indeed owed its separate existence to the first Christian Emperor, Conto the first Christian Emperor, Con-stantine. Treatises of which no copy survived the destruction of the Van-dals in the West were preserved in the East. The Athenian schools of philosophy continued to flourish at least for a time; and for centuries after the destruction of the schools at Athens their studies were carried forward in new Christian schools of Constantinople. Constantinople.

Ultimately, the decay which had destroyed the Western Empire in the fifth century of the Christian Era also worked havoc with the Western Empire. But when the catastrophe came in 1453, the Italian renaissance was already in full swing; and light had come back to Europe.

Thus through one small channel of the Prophetic Tradition a large element of ancient civilization was preserved, to serve as the beginning of the new world. Other fragments, some of them even more important, were preserved in the Jewish and Is-lamic worlds. But these must be dis-cussed separately.



There are more Hebrews than Jew There are more Hebrews than Jewa in Canada. According to the last cen-sus (1931) the number of Hebrews in Canada was 156,726; the number of Jews was 155,614. The term "He-brew" in official Canadian statistics designates racial descent while the term "Jew" designates religious af-filiation. There are evidently in Can-ada over a thousand persons Hebrew by race but not Jewish by religion.

Of all the cities in the U.S. Chelsen Mass, has the denset Jewish popula-tion with 40.92 per cent of the total population. Cleveland Heights, Ohio, is next with 33.57 per cent. New York, N. Y. is third with 29.56 per cent.

According to figures compiled by Dr. A. Ruppin the number of Jews who have been converted to Christian-ity in Vienna between 1868 and 1929 was 28,777 (this figure does not inwas 28,777 (this figure does not in-clude the number of children below the age of seven who were converted with their parents). Vienna had the highest rate of conversion among Jews.


