In the midst of the Arab terror in Palestine, Jewish industry there is not only maintaining its previous position, but is even expanding. One of the most striking examples of this is the phenomenal growth of the Okava razor blade factory established by German refugees. Oddly enough the growth in popularity of Okava blades has been helped by the disturbances. British troops on duty in Palestine became so used to these blades that they continue to order them even when transferred to other British possessions. As a result, Okava blades are now being sold in 30 countries, including the United States. The photo above shows the exterior of the Okava factory at Rishon-le-Zion. AMERICAN JEWISH CONGRESS FACES VITAL CURRENT ISSUES

Dr. Goldmann Makes Powerful Address At Afternoon Session — Group Holds Three Day Session

New York (WNS)—The 550 delegates to the 1938 session of the American Jewish Congress at the Biltmore Hotel here, heard two powerful pleas: One, by Dr. Nahum Goldmann, Chairman of the Administrative Committee of the World Jewish Congress, whose keynote was Judaism's self-defense in the face of catastrophe; the other, by Senator Robert F. Wagner, who implored the Christian world not to be misled into believing that the war of intolerance is "directed only against Jews."

One, enacted last March de-prived Poles of their citizenship if they did anything detrimental to Po-land, or if they remained abroad five years without having any connection with their homeland. The other law, announced on Oct. 6, to be effective Oct. 29, required Polish citizens aoct. 29, required roiss citizens abroad to report to Polish consulates and have certain stamps affixed to their passports if they were to be able to return to Poland. It was the latter ordinance which caused the drive for wholesale deportation.

DEPORTATION OF JEWS HALTED PENDING NEGOTIATIONS BETWEEN REICH AND WARSAW

Berlin (WNS) — Pending final negotiations between Poland and the Reich, Germany has called a halt to mass expulsion of Polish Jews and measures against Germans residing there.

More than 20,000 Polish Jews had been rounded up and herded to the German border ready to be shipped across into their native land when the agreement was reached to suspend deportation measures until more permanent understanding was reachbetween Warsaw and Berlin.

It is estimated that the expulsion order would have affected 50,000 to 60,000 Polish Jews residing in the Reich. Those massed at the frontier number more than 10,000, while the fate of those 5,000 already forced across the border into Poland remains as yet undecided.

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MODERN WITCHCRAFT IS ANTI-SEMITISM

Dorothy Thompson, whose comments on world events are read by millions advances a disturbing explanation of anti-Semitism. She says:

"The leading example of modern witchcraft is anti-Semitism. It is tricked out by those who use it as an instrument of national policy with all the black magic that once was attributed to witches, alchemists, wizards and sorcerers.

"Fifteen million Jews scattered around the world, most of them poor and none of them united, are supposed to hold the whole world in their grip and keep it subjected by an evil spell which is in turn responsible for capitalism, war. Communism, racial degeneration, pacifism and plagues. The Jew is the sole source of all evil, and any communication with the race transmits a subtle poison to the communicator. No one with any Jewish blood ever finds peace within himself. An enemy is within his veins.

"Lost purity of blood disturbs the inner happiness forever,' writes Hitler. 'It sinks men down forever, and the results can never more be eradicated from body or soul.' Like scircerers, the Jews in this new witchcraft possess peculiarly seductive powers. They often appear as angels. Therefore primers and picture books are gotten out for little children to point out to them every real or imagined Jewish characteristic and prepare them to resist the evil eye. One of these picture books in my possession is a truly remarkable example of modern witch-bating. The Jewish physician exists to lure non-Jews under the knife; the Jewish merchant to exploit his clients; the Jewish artist to pervert the senses.

"The believers in this modern witchcraft are immune to reason on this particular subject, however rational they may be on every other matter under the sun. They are exactly like their forebears. The scientific mind was already awake when witches were burned in Salem, but the belief in magic flourished alongside it and often in the same bosom."

And even Miss Thompson, whose keen perception and wit might conceive somewhere in the distance a note of hope, holds out none. Yet witchcraft, once a horrible part of the present became a strange inexplicable quirk of history.

Recently the overwhelming majority of the Italian-American organizations in Connecticut held a state-wide meeting in Hartford, from which a resolution of protest was forwarded to Mussolini. More than 500 leading Connecticut Italians attended the meeting. Here Mr. Rocco Pallotti, former president of the Connecticut Federation of Italian. American clubs, declared the Fascist dictator's anit-Jewish campaign "had been forced on the people of Italy." He urged Italian-Americans to fight against anti-Semitism as the enemy of American democracy and of the Italian people as well.

Italian business executives such as Mr. Frank Serri, president of the Taxpayers and Merchants National Alliance of Brooklyn, is urging Italian-American home-owners to send their protests to Mussolini via the Italian Ambassador.

Mr. Phillip Bongiorno, World War veteran decorated by the Italian government serving in the American Air Service, and former head of the American Sons of Italy, largest Italian-American fraternal order, promised to introduce a resolution against Mussolini's anti-Jewish campaign in Italy, at the fraternal order's forthcoming convention.

Thus, the anti-Semitism of Mussolini is a violation not only of every principle of Americanism. It is travesty on those traditions of freedom and justice loved by the Italian people.

John Hay, Secretary of State under Presidents McKinley and Theodore Roosevelt, was one of our greatest Americans. In celebration of the centennial of his birth, which is being observed throughout this month, B'Nai B'Rith presented a bust of Hay to the city of Cleveland. Mr. Monsky, president of B'Nai B'Rith, tells the story of Secretary Hay's famous interventions on behalf of persecuted Jews abroad.

This month the nation is com rating the centennial of the birth of John Hay, a great American and a great humanitarian, whose memory shines forth brightly on the pages of our country's history. The cele-bration was made possible through the cooperation of Mayor Burton of Cleveland with the B'Nai B'Rith John Hay Memorial Committee, consisting of Philmore J. Haber, Sidney G. Kusworm, Alfred Benesch and Maurice Bisgyer. It is proper that this centennial celebration should be the centennial celebration should be the occasion for the expression of the profound gratitude of B'Nai B'Rith, and of the Jewish people in whose interest B'Nai B'Rith serves, for the philosophy of justice and tolerance which characterized the private and public life of John Hay

public life of John Hay.

In connection with the celebration, B'Nai B'Rith has presented a bronze bust of John Hay to the City of Cleveland, his home community. It will be erected in one of its public parks, where it will stand as a permaparks, where it will stand as a permanent memorial to a personality who was deeply imbued with the true spirit of Americanism. Mayor Burton has commented that the gift of B'Nai civil rights, and the imposition upon them of exceptional taxes, involving the standard of exceptional taxes, involving the exceptional taxes, involving taxes, i B'Rith "adds new strength to the influence of leadership of Hay's spirit." This memorial will serve as a source of inspiration to all who observe it—inspiration to live in accordance with the American way and to see the world as John Hay saw it, a brotherhood of people of all races, creeds and nationalities, in which America has both a great opportunity and a great responsibility for lead-orehim. ership

John Hay was a true champion of the American creed. He was al-ways alert to any violation of the

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principles of our democracy. He pro-tested without reluctance and with-out reservation against any and ev-ery action not consonant with those ideals of tolerance, freedom and jus-tice on which our government was tice on which our government was founded. He was the champion of the oppressed and protector of the per-secuted. The rights of minorities, a problem of such vital concern to us in this day and generation, was to him a sacred responsibility. On more than one occasion did he, at the behest of B'Nai B'Rith, give official expression to the traditional symmethy. B Nat B Rith, give official expression to the traditional sympathy of Ameri-ca for the unfortunate and down-trod-den peoples of the world. His utter-ances, vigorous and firm, come down through the years as models of statesmanship and high-minded liber-ality. These have become a part of America's tradition and serve as pre-cedents for the humanitarian policy America's tradition and serve as pre-cedents for the humanitarian policy of the present Secretary of State, the Honorable Cordell Hull!. With particular reference to John Hay's intervention in behalf of our people, there are three high lights in his administration. The first was in re-sponse to an appeal which Jacob Schiff made in April, 1902 when Jews were suffering under disabilities in were suffering under disabilities in Rumania. Under the guise of negotiating a proposed naturalization treaty with Rumania, the Secretary treaty with Rumania, the Secretar tions to the American Charge in that country. This memorandum stated in part as follows:

"The political disabilities of the as they do wrongs repugnant to the moral sense of liberal modern peo-ples, are not so directly in point for serve it—inspiration to live in accord—my present purpose as the public ance with the American way and to acts which attack the inherent right of man as a breadwinner in the way of agriculture and trade. Human be so circumstanced have virtually alternatives but submissive suffering or flight to some land less un-favorable to them. Removal under such conditions is not and cannot be the healthy, intelligent emigration of a free and self-reliant being. It must be, in most cases, the mere transplantation of an artificially pro duced diseased growth to a new place. Whether consciously and of purpose or not, these helpless people, burden ed and spurned by their native land, are forced by the sovereign power of Rumania upon the charity of the United States. This Government cannot be a tacit party to such an in-ternational wrong. It is constrained to protest against the treatment which the Jews of Rumania are sub-jected, not alone because it has unimpeachable ground to remonstrate against the resultant injury to itself, but in the name of humanity.

Later this confidential instruction was incorporated into a circular let-ter addressed to the signatories of the Berlin Treaty of 1878 which Ru the Berlin Treaty of 1878 which Ru-mania was clearly violeting. The American government, not a signatory of the Berlin Treaty, made an appeal to Great Britain, Germany, Austria-Hungary, France, Italy, Russia and

Asecond opportunity came to Sec-retary Hay to act in behalf of Jews when his attention was called to the unwillingness of Russia to recognize an American passport if carried by an American Jew. He gave directions to his colleagues in which he said those to whom the American Govern issued such passports not agitators, not intending imigrants not persons who will, in any way, be likely to contravene any of the laws or regulations of the country. They are men of good social standing of capital, tourists, students engaged in business in this men engaged country: in all respects innocent and harmless travellers, of the sort that

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Among the other acts of John Hay's career was his and President Theo dore Roosevelt's support of a pe tition signed by American citizens formulated and presented by B'Nai B'Rith, protesting against the Kishinev outrages. While the Russian government declined to receive the pe tition, its contents became known over the world by John Hay's action and were brought home to the Czar of Russia himself.

An oft quoted statement of John Hay was his commendation of the petition in a letter to Leo. N. Levi, President of B'Nai B'Rith, on Octo-

The recent European crisis empha The recent European crisis emphas-sizes the need for the character of statesmanship and the kind of phi-losophy of which John Hay was the symbol and exponent. Grateful to be spared from the catastrophic effects of war, the world remains neverthe less fearful of the future wrongs and discords as a consequence of the dis-memberment of the Czechoslovakian Republic. Intensifying this feeling of apprehension are current develop-ments in Palestine, where a harried

ments in Palestine, where a harried people cries out for justice. It would have been difficult for John Hay to reconcile Germany's in-terest in the Sudeten minorities with Germany's long continued persecution and oppression of hundreds of thousands of minority peoples in just look what company we find at Germany and Austria. John Hay's concept of freedom embraced all of mankind. It will be remembered that Abraham Lincoln had said: "Those who deny freedom to others deserved here." Rill Coldboyg, Lovey Katanana Abraham Lincoln had said: "Those who deny freedom to others deserve it not for themselves, and under a just God, cannot long retain it." Is it any wonder that John Hay, who had served as a private secretary to Lincoln and who had drawn much of his spiritual strength from him, should seek to translate Lincoln's words into action? Hay could not permit the oppressors of one group of mankind to indulge in the hypocrisy of championing the liberties of We may well ask why the lofty

idealism and the principles of justice espoused by John Hay cannot be-come the motivating force in the statesmanship of this day. Has not the world remained too long silent regarding the barbaric cruelties which have prevailed under the dictator-ships of Europe? Have we not by our silence given comfort and en-couragement to the perpetrators of this unprecedented assault on our civilization? Can we not come to ilization that the menacing influence of dictatorships must be retarded? Can democrary be preserved if we stand by and give silent acquiescence to a program which is the very antithesis of democracy's fundamental

principles? These would have been sad days for John Hay. To observe nuns and clerics of the Catholic Church and Jews by the thousands languishing in Jews by the thousands tanguishing in prisons and concentration camps; to observe the devastation of all things sacred to mankind: to see men and women, ther freedom of conscience invaded, their freedom of speech and

press destroyed and every human right violated, would have been to John Hay an inconceivable tragedy. Perhaps the spirit of John Hay will yet prevail. 



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NEARLY THIRD OF NATION SEES ANTI-SEMITISM GROWING HERE, FORTUNE SURVEY REVEALS

New York (WNS)—Nearly one-third of the American people, 32.5%, believe that there is a growing hostility toward the Jews in the United States as compared with 52.5% or more than half, who believe that there is very little anti-Semitism in this country, according to Fortune Magazine's Survey of Public Opinion. Recalling that in January 1936 the Survey reported, on the basis of answers to an indirect question, that there was very little anti-Semitism in the United States, only 14% of the people asknowledge that they sense a thing so subtle and so underground as a change in attitude, Jewry may well find cause for alarm."

The survey reveals that by economic levels differences in opinion on the question of anti-Semitism are negligible, but the two occupations showing the greatest belief that anti-Semitism in the United States, only 14% of the people say-

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States, only 14% of the people saying they believed Germany would be better off for driving out the Jews, tioned by less than 10% more people in the Northeast and Middle West, ple in the Northeast and Middle West, where most of the Jews are concentrated, than in the nation as a whole. Interesting, too, is the fact that in cities of 1,000,000 or over 44.1% see little anti-Semitism as compared with 55.9% of the people in towns under 2,500 who feel this way. On the other hand in cities of 1,000,000 or over 46.7% of the people believe anti-Semitism is growing while in towns under 2,500 only 22% feel that way The survey believes that this disclosure that the larger the community, the more prevalent is anti-Semitism "is a fact of much darker portent to them (the Jews) than what

the nation as a whole believes" since most Jews live in the large cities. Equally interesting is the disclosure that the Jews are hardly more worried about their own standing than are Gentiles. Among Jews 50.3% believe there is very little anti-Se-mitism as compared with 51.3% be-lieve there is very little anti-Semitlieve there is very little anti-Semitism as compared with 51.3% among levels differences in opinion on the question of anti-Semitism are negligible, but the two occupations showing the greatest belief that anti-Semitism is growing are executives, who do the hiring of people, and students, who are in closest touch with campus discriminations. A curious factor is revealed in the Survey in that the trend toward anti-Semitism is mentioned by less than 10% more peotions. of anti-Semitism than is the Jew in a big city. Only 15% of all persons queried for the survey had no opin-ion either way on the growth of anti-Semitism. 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
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I CAN PROVE ITS INTERESTING FACTS

LITERARY ERRORS

Dostoyevsky in The House of the Dead describes a Jew praying in Te-fillin— on the sabbath.

In his essay "On Heroes and Hero orship", Carlyle tells the following Temple—John Erskine. Worship", Carlyle tells the following story about Mohammed: "When he lost his daughter, the things he answered, in his own dialect, though in every way sincere, were yet equivalent to that of Christians: "The Lord giv-eth and the Lord taketh away; bless-ed be the name of the Lord."

The "equivalent to that of Christians" happens to be the traditional Jewish phrase said by mourners. It it taken from Job 1:21.

Tolstoy, in "The Kreutzer Sonata", writes as follows: "Observe the Sab-bath. Be circumcized. Do not steal. bath. Be circumcized. Do not steal. Such are the injunctions of external religious teachings. Love thy God with all thy heart, with all thy soul, and with all thy mind and thy neighbor as thyself! Be ye perfect as your Father in heaven is perfect! Such is Christ's teaching."

What Tolstoy has omitted to state the fact that these last mentioned cardinal ethical principles have been formulated in the Jewish Sacred Writings. They are taken from Deu-teronomy 6:5, Leviticus 19:18 and 19:2 respectively.

As a result of confusing the Hebrew word "mora" (fear) with the word "moreh" (rain), Roman in his "History of Israel" has: "Let the rain of heaven be upon you" instead of "Let the fear of heaven be upon you."

The King James version of the Bible gives the following translation of Job 22:30: "He shall deliver the island of the innocent." This doesn't make sense. There is no mention of an island in the entire chapter. Why should an island suddenly be singled out for deliverance? What happened is that translators confused the Hebrew for "not" with the word for "island." The translation was later revised to read: "He shall deliver even him that is not innocent."

The story of the pound of flesh in "The Merchant of Venice" is based on an actual historical fact—but with the roles reversed. It is recorded that Pope Sextus V, a contemporary of Shakespeare, punished a Christian named Seche who claimed as a result of a wager a pound of flesh from a Jew by the name of Ceneda. The Jew as well as the Christian Shylock were punished, the former for wagering his body, which was the property ing his body, which was the property of his sovereign; the latter, for inhuman cruelty.

Shakespeare never saw a Jew in his life. There were no Jews in Eng-land at that time as they had been expelled in 1290. Nor were there any Jews in Venice at the time "The Merchant of Venice" was written, as they had been expelled some 40 years

A mistranslation in the Vulgate Version of the Bible is responsible for the horns on the head of Moses in Michelangelo's famous statue of the Lawgiver. The Vulgate Version which was considered authoritative which was considered authoritative by the church, rendered Exodus 34:29, "the skin of his (Moses) face sent forth horns." The correct trans-lation is, "the skin of his face shone."

Vassar College Orders Union Book For Text
