MacDonald Reiterates Government's Refusal to Admit 10,000 German-Jewish Children Into Palestine

London (WNS-Palcor Agency)-Pressed by insistent demands by members of Parliament for reconsideration of the Government's decision not to grant permission for the immigra-tion into Palestine of 10,000 German-Jewish children, Colonial Secretary Malcolm MacDonald today told the House of Commons that the Government's decision cannot be changed since approval of the plan for admitting the children would be an al-teration of the existing rate of immigration that would be prejudicial to the principal subjects to be discussed at the forthcoming London confer-ences on the Arab-Jewish problem.

B. B. DISTRICT SEVEN UNITED STATES WILL NOT GIVE **GERMANY APOLOGY SHE DEMANDS**

Secretary Ickes Denounces Nazi Racial Intolerance; Senators Endorse Ickes' Stand

Washington, (WNS)-Diplomatic relations between the United States and Germany were under the severest strain since the World War following the rejection of a Nazi protest by Acting Secretary of State Sumner Welles. Mr. Welles' refusal to accept the German demand for an apology for an attack made on dictators by Secretary of the Interior Harold L. Ickes in a speech he delivered in Cleveland recently to a Zionist audience, was accompanied by a blunt reminder that the German government

could hardly expect the United which is to be next April in Hot States to tolerate similar attacks against United States officials in the Nazi-controlled press. The Acting Secretary informed Dr.

Hans Thomsen, German Charge D'-Affaires in Washington, that Mr. Ickes had voiced the sentiment of the greatest majority of the American people over the recent policies pursued in Germany and that deroga-tory remarks in the Nazi press had been deeply resented here.

The rejection was, the strongest expression of disapproval yet voiced by the United States government and was considered more pointed than the recent recalling of Dr. Hugh R. Wilson, American Ambassador to Germany. It was hinted that the United States had been concerned over Germany's failure to pay Austrian debts and the lack of assurance from Berlin that anti-Jewish decrees would not be applied to Americans living in

The details of the interview between the German Charge d'Affaires and the Acting Secretary of State were revealed by Mr. Welles himself. It had previously been announced in Berlin that a strong protest had been delivered against "course and insult-ing" remarks of Secretary Ickes in his Cleveland speech. Ambassador Wilson is now in this country and Dr. Hans H. Dieckoff, the German Am-bassador to the United States has been recalled for an equally uncertain period.

Secretary Ickes' Denunciation

Washington (WNS)-Secretary of the Interior Harold L. Ickes denoun-ced "a brutal dictator" in his address last Sunday at a dinner of the Cleveland (Ohio) Zionist Society. Mr. Ickes had decried the acceptance of decorations by Americans from a dic-tator and those who accept them "automatically foreswear their American birthright". (Mr. Welles said in talking to Dr. Thomsen that this crit-icism of Mr. Ford and Col. Lindbergh was a purely domestic question in which Germany could have no concern whatever and which he would not discuss.) Mr. Ickes had also said that Germany's persecution of Jews carried that nation back to "a period of history when man was un-lettered, benighted and bestial." Mr. Ickes left it up to the State Department to answer the German protest against his speech.

At a press conference here, Mr. Ickes was greeted by a facetious round of "heils" from newspapermen to which the Secretary replied, "And a Merry Christmas to you." Mr. Ickes would not reveal whether the State Department had asked him to refrain from talking at his press conference although it was known that Sumner Welles, Acting Secretary of State held a telephone conversation with the Interior Secretary shortly before seeing members of the press.

Mr. Ickes said he could not recall ever having mentioned Germany by name in any of his addresses, which, he pointed out, were aimed at dictator governments without specific designation. He expressed the that his Cleveland speech would not be followed by complications similar to those which followed an attack on the Nazi government by Mayor Fiorello H. LaGuardia of New York.

MRS. LEAH GOODMAN SUCCUMBS TO ILLNESS

Member of One of City's Most Prominent Families Stricken Suddenly

Mrs. Leah Hirsch Goodman, a member of one of the city's most promi-nent families, and wife of Ben Goodman, real estate operator, died at the Baptist Hospital Monday night following an emergency operation last week. Mrs. Goodman was 63.

She was first stricken while visiting the apartment of her brotherin-law, Max Heilbronner, who is critically ill with heart disease at the Parkview Hotel.

Funeral services were held at the residence, 2283 Poplar, Tuesday af-ternoon, with Dr. Harry W. Ettelson officiating. Burial was in Congregation Children of Israel Cemetery.

Mrs. Goodman was widely known in musical circles of the Mid-South and was active in a number of wo-men Clubs. She belonged to the Beethoven Club and the Temple Sisterhood and was a member of the Congregation Children of Israel.

Mrs. Goodman was born in Mem phis. She was educated at the old Clara Conway School here and the Boston Conservatory of Music. She was married to Mr. Goodman in 1897.

SAM ABRAHAM

We pause for a moment to pay tribute to the work of Sam Abraham on the Peres Colony.

Mr. Abraham, president of The Memphis Zionist District, threw his forceful personality into the work, and largely thru his efforts and the cooperation of his willing workers, the total of the Peres Colony Fund is now over ten thousand dollars.

Mr. Abraham started with a dinner-at his own expense. Altho the solicitation of funds was not thought of at the time, more than five hundred dollars was raised-Then, out on the field himself, aided by his personal committee, the money started to come in.

Just days remain now before Mr. Peres' Birthday-More of us should take up the task so splendidly started by Mr. Abraham. Ten people, with his ambition and zeal, could more than secure the needed funds in the time which remains.

A FIRM HAND

The plan which was submitted to the Intergovernmental Commission for Refugees in London by Dr. Hjalmar Schacht recently, precipitated a storm of criticism from those countries whose representatives make up the Evian Commission. England thought of it as "Impudence." France called the scheme "Fantastic." The United States believed the plan should be "Privately Financed." Argentina, Mexico and Peru were "Disappointed." Catholics, fearful of the time when their correligionists in Germany will be forced to give up their fortunes, condemned it as "extortion," and Jews everywhere know that their brethren in Germany are being held for "ransom."

This week will find George Rublee, Director of the Intergovernmental body, in Berlin to begin negotiations with the Nazi government in connection with the mass emigration of Jews from Germany. Schacht's plan, although rejected for the most part, will be used as a basis for counter-proposals and compromises

It is quite evident that Hitler wants the whole world to pay for the release of Jews from Germany and at the same time to build up his foreign exchange. It is also evident that Germany is bankrupt and insolvent, and it is therefore the duty of those who represent the Commission to deal with the Nazi government with a firm hand. NOW, while the Nazi government is broke and in dire need for funds, is the time to bring Hitler to his knees. NOW, in its negotiations with officials in Berlin, the Evian Commission can explain and fulfill the reason for its creation.

A RETURN TO THE LAND

It is interesting to note that the Jewish Agricultural Society is making it possible for many Jewish refugees in this country to learn the rudiments of farming and at the same time instill in them a love of agricultural activity. Courses offered by the J. A. S. include dairy farming, hen raising, and truck farming besides a general course in the blanket field of the American landscape. It is quite probable that a sufficient number of refugees may be interested in this line of endeavor to the end that they may become useful and productive citizens, insuring for themselves comfortable homes and paying enterprises by farming.

Two thousand years ago the Hebrews were a peaceful nation of agriculturists, attached to the soil in the land of Canaan. Driven from our ancient land we were forced into the fields of commerce and industry in lands which neither tolerated nor helped us. After centuries of trail blazing in commercial progress and scientific advancement we turn again to agriculture.

It is for our youth to revive the ailing body of Jewry that has fallen victim to the evils of persecution and they can revitalize that body by rural activity and agricultural pursuit. America is still a land of opportunity, especially for those who will dedicate themselves to the soil. Jewish refugees will find no better opportunity for purposes of rehabilitation than to give every consideration, when confronted with the problem of making their own way both for themselves and for their families, to the wide range of opportunities presented in the field of agri-

NEW YEAR TOAST

Mr. Segal (who has lived quite long time) remembers new years of olden times. Yet in the number of years that have passed the olden times are not so remote; the distance between now and then is marked by the deep, enormously wide gulf that is the difference between civilization and savagery. Indeed, the number of years is only five.

Mr. Segal recalls fondly the good new years of that distant past. As one looked from the threshold of a new year he could always see bright lights in the future. Yes, one said then, progress was going on in the world next year. Progress was some-thing inevitable, everybody was sure

He couldn't be sure that his own fortunes would advance. That was in the hand of God. One might fall sick, one might die. But things must always go well in the world, must go forward. The next year was sure to be better for the world than the one before. And if he didn't live to see it, what of it? The world was going to be better for his children. That was all that mattered anyway.

So on new year eve he put on his Tuxedo and his wife her best evening gown and went to the best hotel in town to see the old year out and to welcome the good new year in.

Mr. Segal himself always celebrated his wedding anniversary on new year eve, had his friends in for a merry party, made a great ado about having married. Mr. Segal was very grateful for everything, for it had been a good world in which to marry and to bring up children.

He could always give a heartfelt toast to the new year. "My friends, may the new year be as good as the past. It must be better. The advance of progress is like rivers that keep on flowing and can't be stopped."

I wish you to be strong with the strength of dignity: To walk with a high head; to stand with the grandeur of people who have lived a long time and who, therefore, know that these enemies will be tomorrow's dust in the wind; to be yourself, which is to say to be proud Jews who know they have something more to live for than to be furtive mice afraid of shadows.

I wish you an enlargement of character that must come to all who say, "So shall I guard all the ways of my pain to my people who may be blam-ed for my dereliction. In my uprightness I shall stand as high as the stars.

Trade Unionism is raising as a con-tribution toward Jewish settlement in Palestine, I feel greatly honored to be associated with the distinguished speakers who have already addressed you and not less with the eminent French statesman, Leon Blum, who has just spoken, and whose name the

proposed new colony is to bear.

My own interest in the Zionist movement goes back to the days hen, as a secretary of the British War Cabinet, I was closely concerned with the discussions which led up to the Balfour Declaration, and indeed, was responsible, to good or little, for the actual wording of that famous document. Subsequently, for a good many years, I found myself as Secretary of State for the Colonies, instructed with the more direct responsibility for the administrative execution of the policy then initiated. I can speak, therefore, with personal knowledge of the ideals and aims which animated the British statesmer who gave that solemn pledge to world Jewry and experience with the Jewish pioneers who have made the most of the opportunity afforded them.

I have seen desolate, fever-stricken swamps turned into a smiling landscape of waving wheat, surrounding a prosperous and happy landscape. I have seen barren wastes turned into olive groves and orange fields. I have seen a whole, modern city spring up out of nothing on the empty sea-shore. I have seen men and women rejoicing in freedom and uprightness, the joyousness of creative work, building up a fair and enduring home for their people in the land of their age-long aspirations. Above all, I have seen sturdy, frank and fearless children growing up in what to them is indeed a present land of Promise, and not only a distant Promised land.

witnessed with amazement the change from a decaying backwater of a crumbling empire in its decrepitude to a scene of thriving business and traffic and the progressive happiness of the inhabitants of Palestine.

Inevitably, too, I have been brought in contact with the formidable difficulties arising from the presence of the existing Arab population, the protection of whose rights is as integral a part of the Balfour Declaration as the promise of the Jewish National Home. Resenting the disturbance of their accustomed ways of life and alarmed at the prospect of Jewish domination, they have proved easy victims to agitation, by no means all home-grown or uninterested. British Government has been struggling with the consequence of the dis-orders which had resulted. Their task, once order is restored, will be to see to it that whether by agreement between Jews and Arabs or by direct British decision, the pledges given to both sides in the Balfour Declaration shall be honestly fulfilled, by weighing the scales fairly between both sides in Palestine itself. We cannot, it seems to me, ignore the wider aspects of the problem.

We are entitled to consider how small a portion it is that is affected by Jewish settlement of that spacious Arab World which won its national freedom by the victory of the Allies. We cannot forget, on the other hand, the dire need of the Jews in Central Europe, and, above all, of those who in Germany are suffering under a persecution as bestial in its methods as it is fiendishly cruel in its cold blood

It is for the world to show a liberal and generous spirit to those who can escape from the German Hell on Earth. Yet it remains a fact that nowhere else than in Palestine can com-paratively large numbers be immediately absorbed and be assured not only of refuge or of the hope of eventual assimilation but of an abid-

ing home of their very own.





OUR SPORT WORLD By IRV KUPCINET

Cold Gefulte Fish

Disciples of Izaac Walton, lend me your ears. We had a very interesting experience one day last winter which gives us a maximum of pleasure to recount to you here. The locale was upper western New York State; the time, 8 A. M. and a goodly crowd was there. The sport involved chiseling through the ice of frozen Inrondequoit Bay at a point about 100 feet from shore. Right you are. The sport was ICE FISHING! Incidently, the bay is an inlet of Lake Ontario, one of the Great Inland Lakes.

Ice fishing calls for a knowledge of local conditions and if you are anything but an eskimo, and an easily frozen turnip, it also calls for plenty of woolen clothing, ear muffs. wool mittens, and a fleschel of hot coffee kept hot in a good thermos. Anyone who has ever done any ice fishing knows better than to bring schnapps and also knows that it is foolhardy to fish far from shore alone. There is always the possibility of a blizzard coming up suddenly which may cut off sight of land and make the return trip a real problem. So it is best to keep near other members of the party. Keeping warm is a prime requisite because comfort, above everything, is essential.

The best ice fishing can be done in the morning but continues through until the day darkens. Then the fish seem to stop moving and old veterans regularly quit at 2 or 3 in the after-noon. Among the necessities for ice fishing is an ice chisel for getting through the ice to the water. The use of an ordinary ax is dangerous because apart from the fact that the ax could slip and do real damage to foot or leg it might start a crack in the ice and eventually make the immediate vicinity a danger spot. Next after the chisel are fish sticks with a nail in one end and some ar-rangement for holding line, tip-ups, hooks and sinker. Set-lines are not permitted everywhere but where they are legal the tip-ups can be worked on the principle that when a fish strikes the flag or stick goes up and

sends out its warning signal.

If you are fishing for crappy or perch, bait of shiners or minnows are good. Jigging through the ice is another effective way of fishing and for this a small spinner is usually used above the hook. Two hooks can be used on a single line with or without a spreader but if a spreader is used the hole must be a little larger than the usual 10 to 12 inches wide. These holes should than at the top or fish will be lost by catching at the underedge. In freezing weather it is wise to skim the ice that may form in the hole and for this contingency a large dipper is handy. Ordinary machine oil rubbed on the hands will keep them double-

Assyria, Babylonia, Persia, and Egypt CALENDAR OF EVENTS passed through the same process of growth under agricultural economy, and met death in the stagnant atmos pheres of the city. Highly fortified Nineveh proved itself not the defense, but the grave of Asyrian culture, as Babylon was for the Babylonian, Sardis for the Lydian, and Susa for the Persian.

The Prophetic Tradition has had a similar history. It, too, originated in the desert and reached its culmination in a metropolis. Born at the foot of Mount Sinai, it matured in the valleys of Judah and Israel, and attained the flood tide of its strength in Jerusalem, the metropolis. But here the analogy between history of the Prophetic Tradition and that of all other civilizations ends, for while the destruction of Nineveh, Babylonia, Athens and Rome marked the end of their civilization, the fall of Jerusaem was the prelude to the Babylonian Exile, where the Prophetic Tradition gained new strength and developed new powers. Indeed, so verile did it become in captivity, that it prevented the assimilation of the departed Judaites, and enabled them to perform the miracle--nowhere repeated in history—of bringing Jeru-salem back to life from the dust! Instead of dying at the hands of Nebuchadnezzar's armies, the Pro-phetic Tradition recreated the capital city in which it had flourished. And such was its new vitality, that the rebuilt Jerusalem survived for six centuries. When it fell once more, a prey to the next conqueror, Rome, the Prophetic Tradition still had enough energy to send its ideals throughout the known world, and bring about the conversion of the Empire to some of its doctrines.

Certainly those who are interested in the survival of human civilization can do no better than to study the characteristics of this Tradition and to determine the secret of its asticle we will endeavor to analyze the suggestion which we have offered, that the mystery lies in the curious composition of rural and urban elements which form the Prophetic Tra-

APPEAL FOR AID MADE BY JEWISH PRESS IN GERMANY

Berlin, (WNS) - The only Jewish newspaper permitted in Berlin, Jue-disches Nachrichtenblatt, (a news sheet of two pages) carried an urgent appeal, under the imprimatur of the Propaganda Ministry, to the world in general and the United States in particular to "open the barriers" to Jewish emigration from Germany. Leo Kreindler, editor of the publication, said in his appeal: "In view of so many bitter disappointments and the failure of so many authorities in the world there must arise among the Jews in Germany a feeling that the world is willing to extend to them a certain amount of 'pity,' but that this sympathy ends when practical solutions come into question."

"We imagine," the appeal says, hat the great the United States, could quickly provide Jews from Germany temporary refuge, be it ever so primitive and that in the transplantation of temperary immigrants to other lands an indefinite occupation could occur, ac-cording to individual suitability."

Germany will undoubtedly favor such an enforced emigration if such procedure will pay dividends but the government is unwilling to release any Jewish possessions along with emigrants. The financing of the proposed emigration would, therefore, remain a burden on the outside world.

JEWISH CABINET MEMBERS BOYCOTT TREATY DINNER

Paris, (WNS) - Two Jewish members of the French Cabinet were conspicuously absent from a dinner given by Foreign Minister Georges Bonnet to Joachim von Ribbentrop, the German Foreign Minister, who came here for the signing of the France-German declaration of friendship. Georges Mandel, Minister of Colonies, and Jean Zay, Minister of Education, were not invited. Marshall Petain, last survivor of the hero generals of the World War, and other Cabinet members, including Cesar Campinchi, the Navy Minister, who had been invited, refused to attend. MYTH OF GREAT JEWISH WEALTH



complish for the present refugees at least as much as the Nansen Committee accomplished for the refugees of the 'twenties.

At the same time Jewish public opinion has also been aroused as never before. It is probably no exaggeration to say that Jewry has not been more deeply moved since the Czarist pogroms at the beginning of this century. Jewish sympathies, al-ways easily aroused by pogroms, have never before been so universally stirred as they are now. There is a willingness to act and a readiness to make sacrifices such as one does not remember in recent years. Various not remember in recent years. Various committees spring up spontaneously in every country in Europe and among different classes of Jewry; money is being raised on a big and generous scale; Jewish children are being adopted in the hundreds; numerous schemes and plans for the relief of the refugees are being put into operation by the people them-selves almost without any organization from the professional social lead-ers. The Jewish heart has been touched and the result is a rising tide of ed and the result is a riging tide of generosity and mercy which is truly remarkable. If this great world in-terest coupled with the emotional and spiritual upheaval in Jewry could be



that this is not to be. The upheaval among the Jews and non-Jews alike eat, but it lacks organization. The forces awakened are many, but they lack the unity which alone could make them effective. So far as an observer can judge, a rare opportuni-ty which arises seldom in the life of a people is being frittered away and it looks as if this great revolutionary event in Jewish life will end in the usual ineffective protests or at best, in a more or less successful drive for funds; in nothing else. If this happens, the fault will be almost coully chared by Jews and non-less equally shared by Jews and non-Jews

The non-Jewish world, chiefly un der the leadership of President Roosevelt, has, it is true, made an effort to rise to the situation. It is wrong to minimize the efforts of the various Democratic Governments for the Jev in the present emergency. England and practically every other West-European and overseas Government have relaxed unofficially their immigra tion laws and have admitted and are still admitting many thousands of refugees. The offers of territories n British Guiana, Dutch East Indies Rhodesia, Tanganyika and other places are not to be ignored, even if these offers are accompanied by great difficulties and some are down-right impracticable. It would be ungenerous for the Jews not to admit that throughout this tragedy the non-Jew ish world has shown a profound sym-pathy, goodwill and willingness to help such as Jews have seldom seen before. But this world, at least the official part of it, has acted under one great illusion which vitiated and is nullifying its efforts and is bound, if persisted in, to invalidate everything that it is willing to do for the

This great illusion is a belief which prevails in the non-Jewish world, by those sections which are friendly as well as unfriendly to the Jews that the Jewish people can raise almost any amount of money they need for any purpose. This is a strange illusion. purpose. This is a strange filusion, but it is almost universal among non-jews. It is shared by Hitler and Streicher as well as by some of the most ardent friends of the Jews. Owing to certain historical reasons which have always associated the Jew with moriey, a conviction exists among most non-Jews that whatever is true or untrue about the Jews, they cer-tainly have money in plenty. Hitler and his gang certainly labor under this illusion and many true friends of the Jews are of the same opinion. They are ready to extend sympathy to the Jews in any field, moral, political, social, but when it comes to the financial, they are genuinely con-vinced that the Jews need no sympathy and no help. Jews and capital somehow go hand in hand in the average non-Jewish mind. Jews may be handicapped and even persecuted in many ways, but in money matters

they are in a privileged position.

In the opinion of the writer of this article this illusion (which incidentally is one of the most vicious products as well as causes of anti-Semi-tism) is one of the greatest handicaps in every constructive effort to solve the Jewish problem. Jewish readers need no disillusionment on this point. They know that this belief is one of the most untrue myths about the Jews; that for every Jewish bank-er and financier there are hundreds of thousands of Jews who live in a poverty and need which is heartbreaking; that while there are some Jewish millionaires, the economic foundation of the great mass of the Jewish people is incomparably less cure than that of the poores the poor because in no country (except Palestine) have they the curity which land gives even to the poorest peasants. What every Jew knows, and most non-Jews do not is that the illusion about the fabulous Jewish riches is one of the great historical lies which were conceived in the Middle Ages and have been kept alive by anti-Semitism to the present day. Nothing is more untrue, more pernicious, although more widespread than this belief.

It would be futile to attempt to dispel this illusion by the means of a short article. What I want to point out in the present contribution is only one point about this myth which is curiously overlooked by most people. This is that even if it were true that some Jews possessed the great fabulous wealth which they are reputed to possess, there is no means by which organized Jewry as a whole can make these individuals give a share of this wealth for Jewish purposes. It is generally overlooked that the Jews are not a nation organized political-ly as other people and able to tax

what wonderful achievements could be its members or otherwise force them to contribute for Jewish causes Practically all funds raised by Jews are raised on a voluntary basis. There is absolutely no other way for the Jewish community to collect funds for any purpose except by appealing to its members to give voluntarily whatever they think or feel they can give. Anyone who has had experience of the raising of funds by voluntary contributions knows what a difficult task it is and how thoroughly and completely inadequate it has proved to be for the accomplishment of any big, constructive effort. At best voluntary contributions can be of help in charitable enterprises which seek to alleviate minor suffering or give temporary first aid. Constructive, permanent help on a big scale cannot be handled by charitable institutions and by voluntary contributions. This falls in the province of a State. This is now an exiom which is generally accepted by all

who know anything about social work.

Why should an exception be made with the Jews? And with a problem such as that of refugees? It is true that voluntary charitable Jewish effort has, as a rule, been somewhat higher than the average similar efforts of other people. The funds raised by Jews since the Great War by voluntary contributions are in many respects remarkable and partly responsible for the myth of inexhaustible Jewish wealth. But anyone who knows anything about Jewish fund-raising as the present moment knows that it has reached saturation point and that in any event the Jewish refugee problem at the present moment is of such terrible dimensions that to expect Jewish voluntary effort to dea with it constructively is as reason-able as Hitler's expectations that the wealth of the German Jews should take care of his armament program. It would be futile to hope that the Nazis would abandon a theory which has served so many of their anti-Semitic purposes. But would it be too much to expect of Democratic peo-ple who are mainly friendly to the ws that they should rid themselves of this great and pernicious illusion? Not only is it a dangerous, historic lie, but also the greatest obstacle in the way of constructive solution of many of the outstanding Jewish problems of the day.
